



	Abbeville County School District, et al. v. State of South Carolina: What now? The Abbeville case - sometimes referred to as the Corridor of Shame case or the Equity Case - resulted in the longest trial ever in South Carolina and a ruling by the South Carolina Supreme Court that the State was not meeting its constitutional obligation to provide an opportunity for a minimally adequate education to each child. This presentation, by one of the attorneys for the poor and rural school districts that sued the State and won, will include a review of the history of the case, including the evidence and arguments presented at trial and on appeal. Join us to learn how the State can bring the educational system into constitutional compliance. What remedies are being considered by the parties?
