FOIA: Policy KDB


Written requests are not necessary for documents distributed to the board (six month window).

Fee schedules must be developed and posted online.

Copying fees will not exceed prevailing commercial rates.

Fulfillment fees charged will not exceed the actual cost and the rate is limited to the lowest paid employee that can search, retrieve, and redact the records.

Public bodies may require a twenty-five percent deposit before beginning work and require that any balance be paid at the time of production.

Include nutrition promotion and education, physical activity, and other school-based activities designed to promote student wellness Follow nutrition
guidelines for all foods

Follow Smart Snack standards for marketing and advertising on the school campus during the school day

Review and consider evidence-based strategies in determining wellness goals Provide annual updates on the content and implementation efforts of the wellness policy Provide triennial update assessing compliance with policy, progress in reaching policy goals, and extent to which the policy compares with state and federal models



Designate a district liaison

Work with DSS to develop and implement clear written procedures for transportation

Determine which placement is in the best interest of the student (school of origin is always the first choice)

Settle disputes with DSS via the dispute resolution process with the state department (DSS will win)




Homeless Students: Policy JFABD

Designate a district liaison

Work with parents/legal guardians or unaccompanied youth to make decisions

Determine which placement is in the best interest of the student (school of origin is always the first choice)

Enroll in school of choice pending any disputes



Meal Charges: Rule EF-R

Policy Requirements

Set charge account limits

Determine whether alternate meals will be served, their content, and if students will be charged for them

Provide detailed information on communication methods regarding unpaid balances and possible collection actions

Determine what happens to surplus balances (parent notification, reduced price lunches, account designation)

policies Code of Conduct: Policy JICDA

The regulation was amended to align educational terms with law enforcement jargon and to encourage the use of intervention options such as counseling, behavioral contracts, and service learning projects.

The model rule contains the minimum requirements that must be included in the code of conduct based on the regulation. Districts may and are encouraged to expand on these.

The state department has developed a conduct matrix for districts to use as a tool for teachers and district staff.

School Resource Officers: Policy KLGA

The policy delineates the role of resource officers as law enforcement and not school administration.

Districts must have a memorandum of understanding (MOU) in place with the applicable law enforcement agencies clearly defining the roles of all parties involved.

At the beginning of each school year, district administration will review the terms of the MOU with, and provide a written copy to, both the building level administration and resource officers.



Content and Credit Recovery: Policy IKADD

Content Recovery

- Student is enrolled in the course with the original teacher
- Content is a subset of a full course
- Impact of content recovery work on student grade is at the district's discretion

Credit Recovery

- Student is no longer enrolled in the course and failed to master content
- Student can master the skill without retaking the full course
- The process will not result in an increase in GPA

Student Intervention

- Literacy portfolio and intervention plan
- Parental notification and conferences

Summer Camps

Ninety-six additional hours of reading instruction

Student Retention

- Data driven
- Good cause exemptions
- Appeal
