

Becoming a mobile learner

Travis Allen, Founder and CEO, iSchool Initiative

Travis Allen is a young visionary for digital learning in the classroom. Before graduating high school, Allen created a viral YouTube video on revolutionizing America's education through mobile learning.



Today, he is a senior at Kennesaw State University (KSU) where he operates his growing non-profit organization, iSchool Initiative. The iSchool team is comprised of 13 other ambitious Kennesaw University students with a diverse background of skills and experiences. With the support of his team, Allen has presented in over 26 states & 3 continents allowing him to reach an audience of over 200,000 people. He has been featured on CNN, The Huffington Post, and Forbes; in addition, he is the winner of the 2012 Google Young Minds competition and was invited to the White House for the Education Datapalooza Event.

Disruptive demographics: implications for K-12 education in South Carolina

James H. Johnson, Jr., Ph.D., Kenan Distinguished Professor, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

Dr. Jim Johnson is the William Rand Kenan, Jr. Distinguished Professor of Strategy and Entrepreneurship at UNC's Kenan-Flagler Business School. He is also director of the Ur-



ban Investment Strategies Center at the Frank Hawkins Kenan Institute of Private Enterprise, which focuses on innovative approaches to revitalizing urban areas and on teaching government, community, and nonprofit leaders and managers to become more entrepreneurial and business-like in their operations and service delivery. Dr. Johnson is an expert on community and economic development, the effects of demographic changes on the U.S. workplace, interethnic minority conflict in advanced industrial societies, urban poverty and public policy, and workforce diversity issues. He is widely quoted in national media and appears on national network news programs. Fast Company magazine named Johnson one of the "17...brightest thinkers and doers in the new world of work." Dr. Johnson spent twelve years on the faculty at the University of California, Los Angeles, before coming to UNC-Chapel Hill. He received a bachelor's degree from North Carolina Central University, master's degree from the University of Wisconsin at Madison, and Ph.D. from Michigan State University.

Greetings: 2014 SCASA Superintendent of the Year

Dr. Rose H. Wilder, Superintendent, Clarendon School District One

On May 2, 2013, Dr. Rose Wilder was named Superintendent of the Year for the State of South Carolina. She is completing her 10th year as su-



perintendent in Clarendon School District One where she has led the improvement of academic performance of students. Despite being considered the third highest incidence of poverty in the state, Dr. Wilder has

led Clarendon School District One to be the second highest academically performing high poverty district. She has more than 30 years of service in education. Prior to coming to Clarendon One, she was superintendent in Fairfield County School District. In 1994, Dr. Wilder's appointment as superintendent in Clarendon School District Two was a historical moment. The State newspaper ran a story about the appointment and noted that she was the first black female superintendent in South Carolina since reconstruction and the first black superintendent in Manning. She also has the distinction of being the first black female superintendent in Clarendon One and in Fairfield County School District. Dr. Wilder, currently president of South Carolina Association of School Administrators, has received many awards and recognition for her work as an educator, including being named Outstanding Superintendent in 1999 by SCSBA. Dr. Wilder is married to James C. Wilder.
