



Regulation 58-1

 Each county within the State shall establish a formal Emergency Preparedness organization ... comprised of all county and municipal officials, departments, <u>local school</u> <u>districts</u> ...



Regulation 58-1

 County and municipal officials, departments, employees and <u>local school districts</u> shall support the development and maintenance of appropriate emergency plans and procedures, and participate in necessary preparedness activities.



Local Emergency Planning Committee

- Meets quarterly
- Includes emergency responders, government agencies, non-profits, business and industries



School Safety Committee

- Meets monthly
- Includes law enforcement, fire/rescue, emergency medical services
- Executive level members
