	<ul> <li>Factors and trends affecting state funding for public education</li> <li>The South Carolina Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office (RFA) provides a variety of research and statistics that impact the legislative and budget process and other administrative functions as well. These efforts affect many factors involving public education such as estimates of pupil growth, inflation factors, base student cost, property tax reimbursements and limitations on millage cap increases. In addition, RFA is releasing two new statistical reports this year. One report examines how appropriations by the General Assembly translate into spending at the local level and the second will begin to look at a longitudinal study on the college and career readiness of public school graduates.
