#### SC high court's ruling in Adams v. McMaster — Now what?

In early October, Gov. Henry McMaster's decision to allocate \$32 million in federal pandemic aid to private and religious schools was unanimously declared unconstitutional by the South Carolina Supreme Court, ruling in favor of public schools on all points.
