
K12 funding and other issues in 2026

Funding revisions

- Disproportionate distribution of "new" state funding to charter schools vs. traditional schools discovered in 2025
- Virtual charter school weighting decreased from 0.65 to 0.50
- Budget proviso 1.3 amended to direct RFA to improve alignment of State Aid to Classrooms funding with student enrollment, more consistent distributions, provide report by December 1, 2025.

Bills still on the table

- H.3645 expands paid parental leave from the current six weeks to 12 weeks for birth or adoption of a child and from two weeks to four weeks for co-parents or for fostering a child. Passed the House and in Senate Finance Committee.
- H.3974 allow private providers (e.g., ABA therapists) to deliver **medically necessary services** to students with autism spectrum disorder **during school hours in classroom**, under certain conditions and with appropriate oversight. Passed the House and in Senate Education Committee.
- H.3802 expands and standardizes the rights of home school, charter school, and Governor's school students to participate in extracurricular activities, and career and technical education (CTE) within public school districts.

Bills still in play

- S.416 modifies the automatic, one-year expulsion of students who bring a firearm to school as follows: requires a finding that the student "knowingly" brought the gun to school. Board can modify year expulsion on case-by-case basis. Expelled students not precluded from receiving educational services in an alternative setting, to include virtual programming. Passed the Senate. In House Education Committee.
- H.3431 authorizes public schools, along with parents and minors, to **notify online services** when students may be at risk of harm (such as compulsive use, psychological distress, or exposure to inappropriate features). Passed the House. Amended by Senate and returned to the House.
